### Workshops inspire Cornish girls

A new initiative to inspire girls into tech has been launched at the Stem and Health Skills Centre in Bodmin.

The event, which was hosted by TEC Girls in association with Truro and Penwith College, saw over 100 Year 7 pupils from across Cornwall and Devon in attendance.

The girls took part in workshops for Logic and Coding, Cryptography, Networks and Cyber Security. The event aimed to inspire the girls and their schools to enter the national CyberFirst Girls competition.

Caitlin Gould from TEC Women explained: "We wanted young girls to explore what cybersecurity is. For many, it's a real mystery. We wanted to demystify it, get them excited about it, and see it can be fun, at an early age." As the pupils cracked codes and learned more about the world of cyber security, their confidence grew. Caitlin added: "It was really important for girls to see other girls from around Cornwall interested in tech, so they know they're not alone."

Determined to see change for future young people, Bo decided to study Level 3 Childcare & Education at Penwith College and hopes to pursue a career where she can support and empower young people with disabilities.

Bo was born with several disabilities and facial differences that have affected her daily life. When finishing school, she was looking forward to the inclusive community and abundant student support that college offers.

Since starting college, Bo's confidence has grown to a whole new level after receiving support and learning accommodations from her lecturers. As part of her Childcare course, Bo has had the opportunity to gain valuable work experience in her placement days and apply her knowledge to real life settings. This played a pivotal role in growing her confidence, giving her the resilience to try new things by gently pushing her outside her comfort zone.

Bo said: "I think my favourite part about

college has been how supportive everyone is. Since Penwith is quite a small campus, classes are relatively small as well. This means that I get to know my peers and lecturers much better and that they can give me much more personalised support. Everyone is friendly and approachable and have really made an effort to do everything they can to accommodate my needs."

Raising the profile of people with disabilities has been a passion of Bo's for a long time as she understands first-hand the challenges that come with having a disability. Recently, Bo has ventured into the world of modelling to not only embrace her individuality but also to bring more representation for young people with disabilities and facial differences.

"I think my favourite part about college has been how supportive everyone is."

She said: "For me, growing up with a facial difference was incredibly difficult. I did not see anybody who looked like me in the media and it definitely impacted my confidence. I used to dislike my cleft, especially when I'd see all these stereotypically "perfect" models represented in the media and know that I would never look like them."

# Rugby Goes

Over 25 girls are looking to give a professional career in rugby a try as Truro and Penwith College forms a new Elite Female Rugby Academy. The College's commitment to developing female rugby talent has reached new heights through the exciting programme offered in partnership with Exeter Chiefs. The Female Rugby Academy will now benefit from training and guidance from full-time Exeter Chiefs Academy Coaches and daily contact time alongside their college studies in a new fulltime Elite Academy programme.

The College is an official partner of England Rugby and is proud to have seen many of its Academy players represent their country at international level in the men's game. The programme will now offer the College's talented young women the opportunity to pursue their dream of stepping out at Sandy Park or even Twickenham; aiming to provide female players with a clear route to the highest levels of the sport, combining education and elite rugby opportunities.

To inspire and motivate the players ahead of the new term, the College welcomed a visit from Suzie Appleby, Head Coach of Exeter Chiefs Women. Appleby's visit marked a pivotal moment for the Academy as she spoke to the players about the extensive pathways available to them both during and after their time at the College, including educational prospects that run parallel with pathways into competitive rugby, such as universitylevel play in the BUCS National League, Championship Rugby with Exeter Athletic, the Women's Premiership, and even the chance to represent England's national team, the Red Roses.

Appleby, alongside assistant coach Steve Salvin and a first team players Eilidh Sinclair and Stefania Evans, also held a training and scouting session on the College's rugby pitch with more than 25 girls looking to grab the new opportunity with both hands. Appleby commented on the day: "We're really working hard on developing our local players and bringing them up through the pathways. A day like today is ideal because we're down at the College and to see numbers like this in Truro is amazing.

"There's a big push and drive, and a lot of investment in the Women's game, from grassroots up through to the international level. They couldn't be in a better place at a better time."

The newly formed Elite Female Rugby Academy also attended the prestigious Hartpury Rugby Festival for the first time in history, before the first-year students had even started College, as part of the Academy's pre-season. This season opener is renowned for attracting top elite academies and private schools from across the country, setting the stage for high-level competition and exposure.

Playing in such an elite environment, in front of live-stream cameras broadcasting across the country, was an invaluable experience for the academy players. The tournament offered a glimpse into the intensity of top-level rugby and provided a platform for the athletes to showcase their skills on a national stage.

Elizabeth, a first-year Elite Female Rugby Academy student, commented: "It's a new set-up we've got, it's Elite now, which is really exciting. We've been given these amazing opportunities. Girls' rugby doesn't have the same recognition that the boys do, but we want it just as much."

Fellow student Emily added: "The one thing I really enjoy is the community. We're all motivated by each other. More people have eyes on us this year which gives us the opportunity to play our best."

The future is bright for the next generation of female rugby stars at Truro and Penwith College, and with an abundance of opportunities and inspiring role models, the sky is the limit.

## Top of their Game

Matt Robinson has been selected to play for England Cerebral Palsy (CP) football squad and Matt George, a former sports lecturer for more than ten years at Penwith College, is the England para team's goalkeeping coach and is currently working with men's deaf and ladies' blind para team.

Truro College alumnus Matt Robinson started playing football from five years old at the Mousehole Minis and has now been playing CP Football for over 10 years. While at school, Matt played in the school football teams and he felt this really helped take his mind away from the struggles he was experiencing with fitting in at school.

He talked about his work in para sports: "I was approached to work with the men's Deaf team last season, preparing them for the European Deaf Championships in Turkey where they finished 5th and qualified for the Deaflympics in Tokyo next year.



"I am now part of the England Blind football programme collaborating with the women's team and assisting with the men's team preparing them for the Blind World Cup in India in 2025 as well as aiming to qualify for the 2028 Paralympics in LA."

The College is proud of both Matt Robinson and Matt George for their incredible achievements; it demonstrates another example of former students and lecturers delivering values of reaching and going further.

#### Scoring Goals for a Great Cause

(BSW), the College's charity which has been working with children in Eswatini since 2001. BSW supports the children and community of Shewula, which is home to around 15,000 people, occupies a plateau in the mountains near the eastern border of Eswatini with Mozambique and is removed from the urban areas of the nation. The main aim of BSW is the enablement of AIDs orphans and other vulnerable children to access education. There are two arms of the charity: funding the work of Ayibuy'imbeleko Shewula, the community organisation which distributes food and clothing and provides transport and social care support, and the Child Sponsorship Scheme Shewula (CSSS), which directly supports high school students by helping pay their school fees.

Students like Josie, Ella and Savannah have the opportunity to visit Shewula and see the difference their fundraising makes on the bi-annual Eswatini trip, which is open to IB and Geography students at Truro and Penwith College. The students take part in valuable work with the young people of Shewula and make connections with the community that strengthen the ongoing bonds of friendship between the community and the College.



### Penwith Students Step Up

In recognition of Refugee Week 2024, first year A Level students from Penwith College completed the 10mile section of the St Michael's Way, a walk route from Carbis Bay to Marazion. The walk was to raise awareness of the plight of refugees around the world, many of whom are forced to flee their homes and walk to safety. This year's Refugee Week's theme was "Our Home", making the walk to St Michael's Mount especially apt for the Penwith students. Refugee Week is the world's largest arts & culture festival celebrating the contributions, creativity and resilience of refugees and people seeking sanctuary. The festival is a partnership project coordinated by Counterpoints Arts. Along the way, students were greeted by some fluffy friends and enjoyed a welcome break at Ludgvan Church, thanks to Canon Nigel Marns. A Level student Katie, who took part in the walk, said: "It was such a fantastic opportunity. I've always wanted to complete this walk, and I will definitely do it again. Our lunch break at Trencrom was amazing as we could see back towards Knill's Monument at Carbis Bay, and onwards towards our end goal of St Michael's Mount."

The aim of the Level 2 Diploma for the Early Years Practitioner is to provide students with the knowledge and understanding of babies and young children from 0-7 years of age with applied knowledge in the early years, 0-5 years.

To gain practical experience, students complete 250 hours in a chosen placement whilst undertaking this qualification. By gaining this vocational experience, students will develop an understanding of their chosen workforce, which will enable them to access work or go onto other qualifications in the care sector.

Max wanted to put his own spin on the role and did so through his clothing. 
#### Josie Donates Hair to those In Need

Josie, an International Baccalaureate (IB) student, has cut off 12 inches of her hair and donated it to The Little Princess Trust. Josie isn't new to donating to the charity; she has donated 3 times already, aiming to raise young girls' confidence.

Josie shared: "I always had people telling me how beautiful my hair colour was and that they wished they had it. When I wanted to get my hair cut, my mum suggested I donate it."

The average cost of making a wig has risen to £550, with additional fitting and styling costs bringing the total to £700. The Little Princess Trust provides free real hair wigs to children and young people aged up to 24 who may have lost their hair during cancer treatment or due to other conditions. The charity has now provided over 15,000 wigs to young people, thanks to donations like Josie's. She added: "I hope my story inspires more people to think about donating. I've watched videos of little girls with cancer or alopecia getting their first wig and feeling so confident and beautiful. Hair is definitely an important part of many young girls' self-esteem."





Mark Dunford spoke at the event, inspiring his final cohort of students: "Have courage, believe in what you are doing. Remain in touch with your network of friends."



# Celebrating Success

Over 1,000 students are off to their first choice university after an incredible year for Level 3 results.

After two years of hard work and dedication, supported by the College's brilliant staff, over 1,600 A Level, Vocational Diploma and T Level students collected their results.

For many, the aspiration of gaining a place at their preferred university has been realised, with almost 1,000 students leaving the College this summer having secured entry to their first choice university, including eleven students who received the grades they needed to progress to the University of Oxford and University of Cambridge. With over 2,500 combined A Level entries this year, significantly more than any other A Level provider in Cornwall, the students exceeded UK averages for overall pass rates (98%) and success in achieving the top grades A\*-C (80%).

Almost a third of A Level students gained an A or A\* grade, with over 1,400 A\*-B grades issued. Published data released by Ofqual shows that in comparison to other Further Education colleges across the country, Truro and Penwith College students achieved double the amount of A\*-B grades than those who studied elsewhere.



#### **Aimee is** Unbeatable

Aimee is celebrating after coming in the top 1% in the world of students who have achieved full marks on their twovear course.



Achieving a perfect score is a rare accomplishment, highlighting Aimee's extraordinary capabilities.

A staggering 42 A-level courses achieved a maximum 100% pass rate across a vast range of subjects, including Accounting, Fine Art, Graphics, Classical Civilization, Dance, Economics, Drama, English Literature, English Language, Further Maths and Spanish.

The College's leading regional and national role in STEM (Science, Technology, Maths, Engineering) was evidenced once more, both in the extremely high quality of student outcomes, and in the large volumes of entries. Many A-levels, including multiple STEM subjects such as Biology, Psychology, Maths, Chemistry and Geology, achieved 10%-20% above national averages for high grades.

Over 650 Truro and Penwith College students are also celebrating their superb results in their Level 3 Vocational Diplomas, with a 98% overall pass rate and over half gaining the top grades of triple Distinction or above

(equivalent to 3 A grades or above at A Level) in an array of subjects including Sport and Exercise Science, Health and Social Care and Engineering. 100% of Media (Lens based) Diploma students achieved a high grade, with 70% of students achieving the highest possible grade, as did 82% of Games Design students.

The new T Level qualification is proving popular with students studying subjects such as Early Years Education, Construction, Health and Digital Production completing their studies. T Levels saw a 98% overall pass rate with 86% of students achieving high grades of a merit or distinction grade, equivalent to 3 B's or 3 A's at A Level.

Aimee, from Redruth, scored an unbeatable 45 out of 45 points on her International Baccalaureate (IB) Diploma course at Truro College.

Picking up her results and celebrating with the rest of her cohort and lecturers as they gathered at College one last time, Aimee said: "I was quite nervous leading up to results day and I wasn't sure if I'd get what I needed to get into university, but I'm very happy."

The result places Aimee as the joint highest achiever of all time in the IB from Truro College, and 2024 marks another incredible year of success for the IB Diploma cohort.

The cohort achieved a 92% pass rate, with 77% of students scoring over 30, at an average point score of 34.2. This is well above the global average point score of 30.3.

Truro College is the only provider of the IB Diploma in Cornwall. The course requires students to excel in a broad range of subjects.

"My favourite part of studying the IB was the people I met along the way," said Aimee. "There's a lot of opportunities to try new things and gain new experiences, especially with CAS (Creativity, Action and Service)."

Aimee is now heading to Cambridge University to study Modern and Medieval Languages.

Engineering student William from Havle achieved a Triple Distinction Star helping him achieve his dream job without leaving Cornwall. William has achieved a Level 6 Design Engineering Apprenticeship with Falmouth Docks.

Commenting on his course he said: "I've loved every minute of College. The skills of our lectures and professional workshops are very impressive. Some of the things our lecturers have been doing with the CNC Machines is so impressive, one was trying to get a steel ball machined inside a cube. It was so exciting."

Toni McIntyre, a mum of three from Redruth and step mum Rebecca Armstrong, from St Austell, both qualified as Nursing Associates at the University Centre before taking the top up course to become registered nurses. Neither nurse had far to travel from the University Centre to find employment, with both nurses securing high skilled jobs across the road at Cornwall's main Hospital, Treliske.

"We're home-grown nurses," says an excited Toni. "Patients ask all the time, 'where did you have to go to train?' And they're so pleased when you say 'oh, I trained in Cornwall."

Being a mum, for Toni to be able to further her career locally and live at home was essential. For Rebecca, having the new multi-millionpound STEM and Health Skills Centre in Bodmin on her doorstep, where student nurses train one day a week with the latest equipment in the health simulation suites proved ideal.

When asked how it feels to be the University Centre's first Registered Nurses, both students laughed and commented: "Scary! Like it's really nerve wracking; when you're a student and something goes wrong on the ward, you go and ask the nurse in blue. Now we are the nurses in blue."

Both students are used to pressure, having started their nursing journey as healthcare workers on the wards of Treliske during the Covid 19 crisis. Toni returned to work 17 years after first starting out in healthcare and Rebecca returned to higher education following 10 years in the Navy. As mature students, they were worried about the academic side of the course. Both were surprised at how they adapted and said the support from the university tutors has been "amazing". Both also praised the lifelike simulation suites at Truro and Bodmin and said the equipment was realistic to what they used professionally in the workplace.

Both agreed studying the Nursing Associate course first, which is filled with short placements, let them experience all the distinct roles within healthcare so they could then decide which sector they enjoyed

the most and wanted to specialise in as registered nurses.

Rebecca has chosen to work in haematology and Toni is going into the critical care unit at Treliske hospital.

Tamzin Irvin, lead for Nursing and Allied Health at the University Centre Truro and Penwith, comments: "Their dedication, professionalism

and compassionate care for patients throughout their course has been exemplary. It has been a privilege to support them through their NA qualification and now to see them progress to obtain their full nursing degree.

One of the biggest questions asked by students and parents alike is about transport; how are you going to get to and from College? Find out all about how to get between home and College here; no matter where in Cornwall you are!



The most common form of transport between college and home is the bus. The bus gets you into college on time for your lectures, and a vast range of buses run to areas all over Cornwall. To get the bus, it can be very handy to have a bus pass.

The bus pass allows you to board public buses during and outside of college time, and you can pay for it termly. It can save you a lot of money and time; your bus pass will be available in an app on your phone so there's no need to buy a ticket with the driver every day.

The College offers a very generous bursary scheme which can help most students with the cost of their travel. Bus passes can be expensive, and some students will need to travel long distances to attend college. Anyone who is eligible for financial support through the travel bursary will be given a First Kernow bus pass, which can be used on all services regardless of operator as it is honoured by Transport for Cornwall.

Bus journeys can be long and frustrating, especially when you're stuck in early morning rush hour traffic. But long commutes can be just what you need to catch up with friends, do some revision or just practice some mindfulness before starting your day. You can meet new people who also attend college on your journey, or you might find someone in your classes who takes the same bus as you. Taking the bus is a great chance to make some new friends or catch up with others.

If you want to clear your head before starting class or at the end of a busy day, you can practice mindfulness on the bus. Mindfulness is where you take in everything around you in the current moment, rather than thinking about the past or future. What is going past through the window, and what is happening inside the bus itself? What sounds can you hear? The bus may be busy and noisy, but taking a moment to take in your surroundings regardless of how busy they are can help you feel more secure. Mindfulness can help ease anxiety and relax you at the start and at the end of your day. There are plenty of other ways to get you to your lectures. The College works closely with Cornwall Council and Sustrans, which is the UK's sustainable transport charity. There are multiple walking routes from the centre of Truro or Penzance to the College campuses which are segregated and signposted. This includes the Coosebean Greenway, which connects Truro town centre to the College in 30 minutes.

You can also ride your bike into college! If you live within 5 miles, your journey on a bike may only take 25 minutes. Cycling is a great way to keep fit, help the environment and save you money. There are bike shelters all over campus for you to park your bike, as long as you bring your own bike lock. There are shower and changing facilities on campus, so you can turn your trip to the gym into your commute to College.

No matter where you are in Cornwall, there's a transport option for you to access both of our campuses. Happy travels!
